## WEEKEND OF CHAMPIONS SET Gold Medal Crews to be Honored May 16-18

Bill Purdy says the last 250 meters in the five seat are like it was yesterday, knowing the Syracuse University Varsity Eight was about to win the I.R.A for the first time in modern times. "It's one of the most memorable experiences of my life." It was 25 years ago.

Charlie Mills remembers stroking his S.U. Varsity Eight to the gold medal at the Pan Am Games in 1959. That race seems like yesterday to him. He calls being a part of that crew "one of the largest and best parts of my life." It was 44 years ago.

Now Purdy, Mills and dozens of other Syracuse oarsmen, coxswains and coaches who know how it feels to come across the line first in a championship race will come together to relive those memories, share them with one another, fellow alumni, and the current oarsmen, coxswains and coaches. It will happen at SARA's Weekend of Champions, May 16-18 in Liverpool.

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## Tribute to a Captain

*Syracuse University Crew has lost an outstanding alumnus and friend with the death of Bryan Collier. His teammate, Doug Lehmann sent the following, which we feel is a fitting tribute.*

Just read in the "Orange Exclusive", that Bryan J. Collier, 1961 passed away on January 24, 2003. He was our Captain during our senior year at Syracuse. Bryan was 6'6" and pulled the #5 oar for that season in the varsity boat for every race. Only Bill Sanford, at 6'7" was taller (but 10 pounds lighter).

What does a Captain do? Bryan sent us the following letter on September 10, 1960 to the entire squad:

"To the '61 Crew:

Summer is drawing to a fast close and thoughts of fall turnout are looming up. Our biggest job is to assure a big Frosh turnout this year. We all know how important a good Frosh eight is to keep us all on our toes next spring.

Let's make our goal this year to not allow on potential Frosh coxswain, manager or oarsman thru the registration lines without first having been contacted at least once about signing up. With 100% cooperation we can attain this goal with ease.

Drop into the crew room as soon as you get to campus and let us know what days you will be on Deck!

This year, just as last year, we will divide up into three

teams in order to coordinate our efforts and get 100% coverage. This way a few men won't get stuck with the whole job -- everyone does a little.

I am looking forward to seeing you all again and to start the ball rolling for the '61 season. If you have any ideas on how to get those Frosh out, please drop me a line. Let's make this a year we can be proud of.

## *The Learning Curve*

### *Orange Opens with losses at BU, Brown*

It wasn't what we wanted but at least we've got nine guys who want to fight and that will get you something." That was the word from SU Head Coach Dave Reischman after the opening weekend of the spring 2003 season.

The varsity eight, ranked 15th in the pre-season coaches' poll lost the Conlan Cup race to 19th ranked Boston University, in a "bang, bang" finish. The crews rowed into a 14-16 mph cross-headwind on the Charles River course. The Orangemen took a lead off the start, but the coach said by 500 meters, he knew the crew was in trouble.

"The varsity, I thought, was a little eager. They went firing out of the chute at 43, 44 - a couple beats high, settled a couple beats high and then of course you've got enough adrenaline running through your system the boat feels really good... for about 1,000 meters. After 1,000, we shortened up. It got choppy. The good thing about the race is that BU pulled even with us about 800 meters to go and I was thinking BU was moving pretty well at that point and I thought they were going to just keep going. We fought. We fought really hard and the never got to be more than three seats. We did the only thing you could do when your rhythm's gone, you're short and choppy. With 500 meters we take it up to 37 1/2, 38 and it got shorter and choppier but when you have no rhythm you've got to try something and we threw everything we had at them."

The Orange J.V. came up with the only win of the weekend, rowing through the Terriers and taking it strong across the finish line. "They rowed sort of like I envision a Syracuse crew rowing," Reischman said. "We just sort of steadily throughout the race came back even and came through and I thought rowed a great race."

Sunday morning saw the Orangemen up at four-thirty in Providence, to take on 8<sup>th</sup> ranked Brown in the rain on the Seekonk River. It was a strong tail wind this time and the Bruins made the most of it. SU led off the start, again rowing high, and the crews were even at 500 meters. But Brown edged ahead and took a 3/4 length lead at the halfway point, then added another 3/4 length over the second half of the race. Still, the coach was much happier with the varsity's performance than the day before. "We fought, though. We didn't give anything away in bunches. When we got down we didn't pack it in. We kept fighting hard. They (Brown) had to earn every seat they got."

The Jayvees' performance was not as strong as the day before, and Brown raced to an easy win. "Now we go from this stiff headwind to a really stiff tail and the JV had trouble with it. As good as their race was against BU it was the exact opposite against Brown."

With two races under their belts and two weeks to get

ready for the home opener against Rutgers, Reischman was seeing the upside.

"The good news is what we're doing through the water is fine. We're putting the effort in. There's a lot of things we can do out of the water on the recovery to get a little more run out of the boat. If you look at the two crews side by side it's obvious we're working a lot harder than the crews we're racing. That's a good thing because that means there's a lot more speed for us to gain as we make those changes."

The Coach said SU's veteran oarsmen have a tendency to try to win races with the start and the finish. He's trying to teach them something different.

"I'm a base pace guy- you grab your lunch bucket and go to work. You set a challenging pace by not making mistakes, but not slowing the boat down between strokes. And that's what we're doing right now we're just getting a little too eager coming forward and not letting the boat work for us as much as we could do."

It's apparent we have guys that want to fight and if you have guys that want to fight and have the ability to make changes then you're going to get faster as the season goes on.

I'm confident that as the season goes on we're going to learn something and we're going to get faster."

## Masters Rowing Update

*Ted Kakas '64 is Chairman of the US Rowing Masters Committee. With so many SU alumni involved in masters rowing, **The Orange Oar** asked him for an update on Masters Rowing issues. Here is his report:*

Approval has been given for 21 to 26 yr olds to race at masters regattas. We were losing a lot of post college oars because they didn't have time, interest or ability to compete at senior Nationals, National team or even Canadian Henley so we wanted to offer a chance for them to stay involved at a slightly less competitive level.

We changed the rule that limits competitors at Masters Nationals to compete for only one club. That rule stands for rowers but coxswains may cox for other crews except for the "Club" races where they can only compete for their club.

Also at Masters Nationals we are proposing awarding multiple sets of medals in races with more than one age category. Currently those races are handicapped and only one set of medals is awarded.

We are working to get rowing included in the National Senior Olympics in Pittsburg in 2005. Rowing has never been part of the Senior Olympics and Pittsburg would be a great place to get started as a "demo" event. We are debating a one time weight-in for lightweights (instead of having to weigh-in everyday) at the 4 day Masters Nationals.

We are concerned that FISA dropped the H2 (75 yr. old) category at the FISA World Masters in Vichy. We have asked them to reconsider for Hamburg in 2005.

We are having Masters Sweep Camps at U. of Washington with Bob Ernst and Jan Harville, Northeastern with Buzz Congram and Holly Metcalf, UCLA with Hartmut Buschbacher (former Nat. team coach) and Amy Fuller (UCLA) and at Temple with Gavin White (Temple) and Barb Kirch (Penn). All will be 3 day weekend camps in July.
