SU Women Take to the Road While Orange Men Look to a Home Opener with the Rutgers Scarlet Knights

SU Women Beat Cornell, Trail Yale

Coach Kris Sanford's Orange Women opened their "Season on the Road" with a series of second place finishes at Ithaca, March 21. Fifth-ranked Yale swept the Varsity, 2V and Novice races with SU second, and the Big Red of Cornell trailing.

"I'm never going to be satisfied with losing to a crew by 15 seconds," Coach Sanford told *The Orange Oar.* "However I think we are progressing in the right direction as each of the boats raced well against Cornell."

SU's varsity understroked Yale by four beats all the way down the course, Sanford said. "The goal is to close the gap with these top crews by sprints. We do that by learning from each race we row and by gaining confidence." *(See Women—Page Three)*

Orange Men Start 11th in Poll

In spite of an eighth place finish at the IRA and most of last year's varsity back for more, SU found itself outside the Top Ten in the US Rowing Collegiate Men's pre-season poll. SU was in a tie for eleventh with Cornell and Navy was just ahead in the tenth spot. It won't take long to sort that out at Annapolis, but first the Orange is getting set for its opener at home with the Scarlet Knights of Rutgers. (See Men—Page Four)

Spring in Tennessee

The SU Women went for a change of scenery during spring training, driving to Oak Ridge, Tennessee for the first time in a decade. "While we didn't have the hot weather or sunshine we've had in years past in Melbourne (FL), the water was beautiful!" Senior coxswain Erin Cunningham told *The Orange Oar.*

"I was a bit skeptical as we heard that there was going to be 20 others teams training there at the same time but there was never a time where we felt like people were in our way," Coach Sanford said. "Since there were so many other teams training at the same facility we had a constant reminder of why we were there, what we needed to accomplish, and possibly a view for the future since Oak Ridge is the site for the NCAA Championships in May," Junior coxswain Tina Campagna said.

SU finished the week with a series of races against the University of Buffalo and won them all. "Building confidence is so crucial to our success this year, so it was great to have an opportunity to go out and race twice and follow our own race plan and to have it work," Sanford said.

"Currently, we have just enough people to fill out all events at Big East - this is the first time in a few years, so barring no injuries, we should be in the best position to take back the title as we have been in years."

Coach Cannon Leaving

Assistant Sarah Cannon has taken a job as an assistant coach at the University of Virginia beginning June 1. She will be fulfilling all of her normal duties between now and then. Sanford said she'll be conducting a nationwide search for Cannon's replacement.

Head Coach Dave Reischman says he and the crews are well aware of high expectations for them, especially among alums. "I can assure you that my guys have higher expectations than anyone else out there," Reischman told *The Orange Oar*. "The plan is to throw all these expectations out the window and focus on what we can control on a daily basis: our work ethic and the daily attitude around the boathouse."

The schedule includes two home races - Rutgers on April 14 and Dartmouth on May 20.

There've been a couple of changes to the road schedule with the Goes Cup at Navy changed to Friday April 20, reportedly so as not to conflict with the opening of the rockfish season, and the Conlan Cup versus BU and Columbia in New Rochelle, N.Y. pushed to Sunday April 29 because of a scheduling conflict.

Brief Breather from Tough Competition

The Orange Men come off a Spring Break training trip to Columbia, South Carolina. Reischman said training conditions there "were the best we have seen in the five years I have been here. I think we had a ripple, and I mean slight ripple, on the water twice in 12 practices."

The crews and coaches took advantage of it. "After about three days of getting the feel for the water back we pretty much used the rest of the week for seat racing with a couple of recovery rows in between so no one accused the coaching staff of cruel and unusual punishment. We made a lot of good technical changes over the winter by alternating between the ergs, sliders, and tank. The guys seem to have a more uniform rhythm and we seem to be able to get decent rows even though we are changing lineups daily (or several times in a practice as the case may be.)"

Back in Syracuse the team found the ice melting off the Seneca River but the water was high, and that brought with it the usual problems including the stray tree limb and an occasional ice floe. Everybody hoped for higher temperatures.

Washington gets the pre-season #1 ranking but the Orange Men weren't thinking about that, or even about another undefeated regular season. They were thinking about Rutgers in the opening race. The expectations are there, but you can't go unbeaten if you don't win the first one. Focus.

"When you have confidence in yourself and your boatmates--that they are doing everything they can to make the boat go fast-all the other worries just sort of disappear," Reischman said.


