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# Split Seconds at the IRA— SU Crews Back in the Upper Tier



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# The 2009 "Season of Belief" turned into the season of split seconds for the SU

**men** – as Maxwell Smart used to say "missed it by **this** much." Still, in a season that started (San Diego Crew Classic) and ended (IRA at Sacramento) on the West Coast, the Orange proved there had been plenty of reason to believe, battling the top crews all the way and finishing in the top eight in the nation. It seems that everybody had gotten aboard Senior Captain Martin Etem's bus, not backing down from anybody.

About those split seconds - the Varsity eight missed the grand final at the Eastern Sprints by two-tenths of a second. Ditto the freshman eight. The Jayvee had been edged by Yale in the petite final.

At the IRA, all the SU crews got back into the upper tier. The V8 was second to last year's champions, Wisconsin by less than a length in the petite final. And an Orange crew finally got one "by this much," as the Jayvee came through Stanford in its petite final and nipped the Cardinal at the wire by a bow ball.

# Coach Sanford's assessment - Respectable, Not Satisfied

Head Coach Kris Sanford has the depth she's been looking for on her squad. But she's still looking for higher finishes. The Orange Women again fell short of an NCAA bid in 2009. "When I look back at the results from the year, I am not satisfied," Sanford said in an e-mail to alumnae and other team supporters. "Our goal remains to make it back to the NCAA championship and we were about 12 – 15 seconds out of reach of that this year."

SU wrapped up the season at the EAWRC sprints in Camden, New Jersey. "We finished a respectable seventh overall in the team points (the highest we have ever finished is sixth)," Sanford wrote.

"The V8 finished tenth overall in a great photo finish race, the 2V8 finished ninth and the V4 finished seventh."

The Varsity Eight had gone into the Sprints seeded eighth, but wound up trailing a Penn team it had beaten earlier along with Columbia and Rhode Island. "The varsity eight rowed a great petite final that was a dogfight for places 2-5," Sanford told the Orange Oar. "I was following the race on my bike and every time we lost sight of the course, the order had changed when we picked them back up.

"We definitely picked up speed the last few weeks of the season. We had a three week break between Big East and Sprints which is a lot of time. We chose to train in Saratoga to break the monotony of training. Unfortunately, other schools picked up speed as well and rowed faster that day."

The Novice eight and third varsity four "B" boat were SU's top finishers at the Sprints. Both rowed their way into the grand finals where they wound up sixth.

Sanford had plenty of athletes to choose from as she slotted the lineups this season, with more than 50 on the roster. Most of them will be back, and although first boat cox Kate Todd and stroke Liz Henwood have graduated along with Jess Tacinelli, prospects for 2010 look good.

"I expect that the strength of our numbers will continue," Sanford said. "As all NCAA bids are based around the team (V8, IIV8, V4), it is of vital importance to have a large team."

2V Cox Lydia Wong returns and likely will compete with rising soph Allison Todd, among others to succeed Todd's big sister Kate in the V8. More than a couple of boatloads of sophs will fight for seats, among them the Carlson twins, Mary and Naomi who rowed 2V most of this season.

"The freshmen were great this year and are hungry to step up and fill in shoes from those we lost," Sanford said. And before we get too caught up in the Class of 2012, let's not forget the Class of 2010. "We will have a very strong senior class of around 14 athletes including two 'super seniors' (athletes in their 5<sup>th</sup> year)." Four of them, Sydney Axson, Susan Groff, Heidi Bulk and Katie Lynch were in the V8 this year, along with rising juniors Natalie Mastracci and Rachel Ogundiran.

In addition to strength in numbers, Sanford plans to have SU move up through, well, strength...and conditioning. "We sent everyone home with their summer workout packets," Sanford said. "Upon return, they will have to compete in a 6 mile run, a 6k erg test, some weight lifting tests and pass certain standards in order to get into a boat. Rowing can no longer be a nine month commitment if we want to compete against the best, so we are emphasizing summer workouts."

The Freshman eight fought Princeton to the finish but the Tigers got the oars in the water last, edging SU by half a second in the petite final. The Varsity four fought its way into the Grand Final and finished fifth.

All this happened in front of a good-sized and vocal crowd of Syracuse supporters - alums, parents, family and friends, some from nearby, many who had traveled cross-country to this first IRA on the West Coast. (See Joe Paduda's "View from the Shore.)

Washington swept the regatta, getting by Cal in the sprint to win the varsity eight grand final. But other than the Huskies' runaway in the freshman eights, parity was plain as day. SU Head Coach Dave Reischman offered this observation:

"If you have ever wondered how competitive the IRA is each year: Wisconsin (last year's national champion) re turned six athletes from the previous year, Northeastern (4th place last year in the Grand) returned five or six, and Columbia (6th place in the Grand last year) returned five or six. All were in the petite final this year. You have to be "on" for the entire weekend."

With just two seniors in the boat, SU moved up from the third level in 2008 and beat both Columbia and Northeastern this year. Boston University, which SU had beaten head-to-head in the Conlan Cup, made the grand finals at the Sprints and IRA. And after losing the Goes Cup to Cornell, SU came back and beat the Big Read twice at the IRA. That's parity. And often that means split seconds.

Along with the loss to Cornell (and a win over Navy) in the Goes Cup Race, the SU Varsity Eight season included wins over BU and Columbia in Boston, and a sweep of Dartmouth at SU, the week after the Sprints.

"I thought all of our crews did some very good racing at the IRA," Reischman told *The Orange Oar.* "To finish 8, 7, 8, and 5 in the V8, JV8, F8, and Open 4+ events showed some depth that we haven't had during my tenure. With all of our boats dominated by underclassmen it should be an interesting next couple of years. All of our crews were particularly strong in the second 1000m which tells me we are starting to mature as athletes and understand the effort and efficiency needed down the race course."

While SU loses six-man and captain Etem and five-man Marko Trnavcevic, the rest of the V8 should return along with five of the Jayvee and a boatload of strong freshmen moving up to varsity. The 2010 season is a long way off, but from the summer of 2009, it looks like another season of belief...and proving it.

#### Orange Men at U23 Camp

Two members of the Syracuse crew were selected to participate in the 2009 Under 23 U.S. National Team Selection Camp. Senior **Martin Etem** and sophomore **Mike Gennaro**, both members of the varsity eight, went to camp in Oklahoma City. This is Etem's second invitation to the camp, as he was invited to the 2008 selection camp. It's Gennaro's first invite. He stroked the freshman eight last year and transitioned to stroke of the varsity eight for this season. Etem and Gennaro are two of 32 collegiate rowers who represented 17 different universities in Oklahoma City. As we posted, they were still with the squad as it moved to training in Princeton, New Jersey, but final selections had not been made.



The 107<sup>th</sup> IRA started bright and early Thursday morning. Well, at least it was early. The weather was unseasonably cool and cloudy, with temps in the high fifties when the first crews waded out into Lake Natoma to launch their shells. The sun finally broke thru hours later, but by then most of the heats had gone by and the concessionaire was doing a brisk business selling IRA-logo sweatshirts. A far cry from the hundred-plus degree temps of the previous week.

The venue was, except for the parking, excellent. And unlike every other regatta I've ever been to, you could actually watch the whole race from start to finish. Cameras were set up above the course at five hundred meter marks, as well as the start and finish. A very solid production crew kept the video feeding to a Jumbotron at the 1750 meter mark, where it faced the finish line area. As the tents and main viewing area were between the Jumbotron and the finish, and lane one was no more than fifty feet off the beach, you couldn't ask for a better 'spectator experience.'

With the exception of the freshman eights, there were no pre-ordained favorites in any of the heavy eight events: Boston U had recently beaten Sprints champion Brown in the Varsity eights, Cal, Stanford, and UWashington had traded wins throughout the dual and Pac Ten championships, and the JVs were anyone's guess. The open four is always a guessing game, with some of the

name crews loading up their fours with talent in what we used to call "pot hunting".

The early favorites for the V8 were the West Coast crews, with only a few die-hard east coast EARC types speaking up for Harvard or Brown, and a voice here and there claiming Wisco would repeat. By now the results are out there; if you didn't catch the streaming video during the race (and for shame if you didn't...), it's probably out there on YouTube. Oh, the really loud guy on the video yelling "Go Orange!"; that's me.



There were quite a few parents there for the Thursday heats and afternoon varsity reps, and alums started trickling in later that day. Tell the truth, Thursday wasn't terribly newsworthy, except for the Orange Varsity's parade into the A/B finals, which they achieved by defeating Oregon State (much to the delight of Coach Reischman). After rowing a 36-37 for the first thousand, the guys gradually took it down for the next thousand, crossing the finish at a very powerful 26. Notably, the announcers were remarking that SU at a 37 looked as controlled and powerful as most crews at a 34.

The only disappointing heat/rep race was the open four's heat, where it looked to your author like they packed it in early in the race. While the other crews shut down in their heats, that was strategic and based on an overall plan to expend as little energy as possible before the big race; the open four is about as wide-open an event as there is but the guys just didn't perform in their initial race. That changed – a lot – in their rep.

The JV entries were a little light, so they only had heats reps and finals. They finished second in their rep on Friday, so it was off to the petite final. The frosh had to go thru the reps as well, and missed the grands by one spot.

The Varsity semi was loaded. Seeded eleventh, we were the lowest seed in our semi, which included Northeastern, Columbia,

Pac Ten silver medalist Stanford, eventual champion Washington and Eastern Sprints champion Brown. The guys rowed a bit of a different race strategy, looking to stay in contact with the leaders through the first thousand and then it all out. We were seven seats down on fourth at the midway point, rowed thru Columbia but just did not have the horsepower to earn a spot in the grand nals. By the way, Wisco didn't get into the grands either, despite returning six members of last year's IRA championship crew.

The open four was a different crew on Friday, rowing a very gutsy race all the way down the course, never giving in and rowing thru Cornell in the last twenty strokes to earn a spot in the grand final. The crew, comprised of two sophomores and two freshman in the rowing seats, learned a lot about themselves in six and a half minutes. (Cornell crabbed just meters from the finish, accounting for the five second differential)

Saturday dawned with the three eights in the petites and the open four in the grand. Due to the guys' strong performance in the semis (or for the JV, the rep), all SU crews were in the favored lanes (one and two).

The JV petites were sweet revenge for the sprints – where all true SU Crew aficionados will recall we lost three races by a combined half a second. (Say it, "One thousa...") Yep, that was the difference – combined – for all three races. But the JV had had enough of that, and pulling out an oft-practiced but heretofore-unused 'emergency sprint', jumped the rating up to 43 for about a dozen strokes, walked two seats on Stanford (Pac Ten bronze medalist) in the last hundred meters, and won the petites by four-one thousandths of a second. In distance, less than a bow ball. This was a do-or-die strategy. If the cox (Jamie Hubbell) didn't get it timed exactly perfectly right, the crew would spontaneously explode before reaching the finish line. But Jamie did, and the crew didn't, and the long-delayed announcement of the result had the hundred-plus Orange fans hollering at maximum volume. The guys looked really happy coming off the water, as well they should.

In the frosh final, the result was almost as close, with the Orange coming out on the short end despite a big move in the last five hundred. They were well out on the rest of the field, but a half-second (One thous...) down to Stanford. There's some serious talent in that boat, and Coach Weiss felt they rowed as well as they had all year.

After the first 500, the V8 final was a three way duel with Wisco and Cornell. In the last 500 the Orange sprinted thru Cornell (our split was almost four seconds faster) but couldn't catch Wisco.

A couple interesting (at least to me) takeaways; we've been bedeviled by Northeastern (fourth in 2008 IRA) for years, and both

NU and Columbia (sixth in grands last year) retained most of their guys from last year's entries. The Varsity beat Columbia and NU twice, and by not-inconsiderable margins, on consecutive days. They also finished less than a length down to a Wisco crew that included six guys who won the whole thing last year.

The open four finished fifth, not really in contention for a top spot but in the race, and racing hard the entire way. These guys have something to build on for next year, and with the latent talent in that boat, they could be pushing for slots in the top boats next year.

Washington's frosh is blindingly fast. They won by a lot, easily, as they have all year. They just blew the field apart. With three internationals in the crew, it's no surprise that some UDub fans were saying they could be faster than their varsity. Don't start thinking dynasty just yet; remember Wisco...

The alumni eight event was a blow out as well – but this time the Orange did the blowing out. Rowing a 35 for most of the course, the old guys were thru Cornell by 800 gone and Joey Peter couldn't see any of the other eights until they had turned around after the finish. The alums won by ten-plus seconds, and looked darn good doing it. Congratulations to Joey, Bob Price, Bill Purdy, Tom Darling, Drew Harrison, Steve Rogers, Bill Bater, Ted Kakas, and Jim Edmonds. Well rowed!

The venue was excellent, viewing terrific, alumni support great (MacVittie, Johansen, E-VON-cie, Jay Rhodes, a number of older alums from the area, and of course the studs in the Alumni Eight), and the concierge services provided by Sheila Evancie were top notch.

Sheila organized a wine tasting, group dinner in Old Sacramento, the tent and tickets. She and Tom really made a good weekend a very memorable one. Parents and alumni mixed to a greater degree than I've ever seen, adding a lot to the entire experience.

Looking forward to Camden in 2010; who's going to set up the wine tour of greater Camden?

"In the last 500...good length, no hurry and in full control," Coxswain Joe Peter '69, added.

SU boasted former Olympians **Bill Purdy** '81 and **Tom Darling** '83 in the five and seven seats. **Drew Harrison** '68, who pulls a mean oar and has coached successfully at every level, was sandwiched between them at six. "My focus was mainly on one aggressive long stroke at a time until we crossed the line," he said.

**Bill Bater '79**, was at four. "It was a great race and the lineup was stellar, but you know you are getting old when you start racing with the coach (Harrison) you had at SU!" he laughed.

**Steve Rogers** '69 – at three, came down from Corvallis, Oregon for his first stint in the SU alumni eight on the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of his last IRA race. "It isn't often that I get to row in a boat that feels that together right from the first hard 10 during our Friday practice," he said.

The bow pair have been solid for SU it seems as long as there's been an alumni race – **Ted Kakas** '64 at two and **Jim Edmonds** '59 in bow. Kakas signs off all his correspondence with "Row Hard!" and he said the Orange alums did that and more. "I must say that it is really a pleasure rowing with the alumni crew because all are of a like mind and have the same goal of each doing what it takes to win on a regular basis."

The victorious alums were in harmony on one more point – a bit of perspective before anybody gets carried away over their win. Harrison said it well –

"It's nice that we alums get to take it seriously for 2000m, but please keep most of the attention on what the SU crew did. I hope that some of those guys noticed that rowers can keep trying to excel long beyond graduation, but for now most of the attention should go to their efforts."

And Tom Darling, the three-time Olympian added this:

"This alumni race is about supporting the undergraduates. We hope by being there we can show the team and other alums that competition is good. We support the undergraduates' hard work and effort by taking part and supporting their races as well. I am sure they probably think we are crazy and 80 percent of the undergraduates can't wait to graduate and to hang up their oars. I mean who in his right mind keeps rowing? Just ask Bill Bater (Class of 79, four-seat) who after the alumni race exclaimed that it took him 30 years to win an IRA gold medal. Like I said ...it's never over until it's over."

#### Class of 2013

Assistant Coach Alicea Kochis is bringing in a class of athletes this fall and while there is some experience, potential seems to be the key word. "We made a concerted effort to build the height and athleticism of our program," Kochis told *The Orange Oar*. "To do that we took some risks and recruited athletes who may not have an extensive rowing resume. Though it may take a bit longer to develop them, I think in the long run it is going to an outstanding class for our program."

There are ten recruited athletes coming in, among them:

Laura Adams - a lifelong water polo player from Southern California. "She is tough, competitive and her body type (6'1", 160) screams perfect for our sport though she has never picked up an oar." Gina Biascoechea - is 6'2" and has been involved with the junior national team system. "She is still developing as an athlete and is eager to continue improving to excel at the collegiate level." Natalie Irvine - from Scotland and has the most rowing experience; she won the Scottish Champion-

ships in several events and medaled at the United Kingdom National Championship. She has been named to the 2009 Scottish National Team.

Macey Miller - a three sport athlete from New Jersey who has had a lot of success on the water and on the erg despite not specializing in the sport.

Kochis describes Irvine and Miller as the "two anchors of this class. Both seem to be natural leaders and Kris and I are excited to see what they do here!"

# **Facilities and Equipment**

The coaches know success takes more than hard work. "We identified a few areas this past year that we worked on including updating our facilities and equipment in order to attract better recruits as well as giving our current athletes the equipment they feel they need to succeed," Sanford said.

The women's locker room is being upgraded this summer thanks to contributions from SU backers (see list of donors, page 11) and now Sanford is looking to upgrade the fleet of shells.

The top crews are rowing in equipment that is one-three years old, but "our lower end boats and training boats

are in need of replacement.

"Recruits notice this stuff when they walk into a boathouse and the condition and age of our boats is an important selling point," Sanford said. "Current athletes should have the opportunity to row in top notch equipment."

# **Honors for Orange Women**

Junior **Natalie Mastracci** was named to the Under 23 Canadian 8 team which will represent Canada at the World Rowing Under 23 Championships in Brandenburg, Germany, from July 17 to 20.

Junior **Katie Lynch** was invited to the U.S. U23 Lightweight Women's Sculling Camp but was unable to attend because of a rib injury.

Sophomore **Rachael Ogundiran** was invited to train at the U.S. Women's National Pre-Elite Camp in Bloomington, Indiana this summer.

Senior **Sarah Stapp**, Junior **Ildiko Toth** and Sophomores **Julie Ruskin** and **Catherine Wilcox** were named National Scholar-Athletes by the Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association (CRCA). To qualify student-athletes much have a 3.5 cumulative grade-point-average or higher, be in their second, third or fourth year of eligibility and have participated in 75 percent of the team's races.

# CELEBRATING RICK'S LIFE

It was the kind of get-together his friends and family said Rick Horn would have liked. That's a good thing, since it was all about him. And you'd have been very hard-pressed to say he wasn't there at Pascale's in downtown Syracuse on Saturday night and at the SU Boathouse on Sunday morning as his beloved Orange swept the Big Green of Dartmouth and then SARA presented his parents with an oar and a plaque to say how much he means to Syracuse Crew.

"Rick may not be with us physically...but Rick lives on with these guys each and every day," his former coach Larry Laszlo told a crowd of more than 100 team members, family and alums. "His spirit is woven into the fabric that is Syracuse Rowing."

We know the story – how Rick fought cancer as an undergrad and member of the crew, how he kept fighting for nearly 20 years after his graduation and how we finally lost him last Fall. The dinner on Friday night brought teammates, schoolmates who never rowed and friends from New York City, where he'd gone to work. They told stories of how he'd brought them together. His parents, Fred and Mary were there to share the laughter and the tears, along with his coaches, Bill Sanford and Laszlo. Mary brought a shopping bag of Rick's ties and passed them out. He was a snappy dresser, she said. He liked ties. We'll wear them as a tribute.

"We're here to celebrate Rick Horn's life, today," Coach Bill Sanford said Saturday morning, after the Packard Cup had been duly awarded to SU and Mary and Fred Horn were called to the front. The oar they gave to them is a throwback – the kind of oar Rick pulled, painted as SU oars were in those days, when he was part of a powerhouse crew that included Jeff Pesot, Scott Baltazar, Chris Ludden, Colin Goodale and Pat Young, among others who were there.

"Rick loved rowing," his father told the crowd. "Probably the highlight of his career was Henley in 1988."
