Orange Women's Varsity Eight Battles BU in First 500 Meters on Onondaga Lake

SU Women Race Early, Often

What the Orange V8 was hoping to do on a chilly March 31 Saturday morning was get past Boston University's Terriers and then see how it measured up against mighty Cornell. What happened instead was BU rowing past SU in the second half of the race to edge the Orange by two seconds, thus getting the privilege of being clobbered by the Big Red, while SU took it out on Rutgers in the second set of races..

The rest of the Orange crews (2V8, V4, 3V8) knocked off BU and then took some lumps from Cornell.

Saturday's races—two 2Ks about two hours apart, were the second and third of the season for the young Orange women. They had already tasted for-real competition before they broke Spring Camp in South Carolina, (See Women—Page 4)

Orange Men Scrimmage vs. Princeton, Georgetown


The SU Men's crew had a lot of holes to fill starting the new season, with three-year stroke Mike Gennaro and three other members of the 2011 varsity eight gone to graduation. "I have no clue whatsoever how we are going to do this spring," Coach Dave Reischman told *The Orange Oar* after Spring Break training in South Carolina. He probably has a better idea now, after a day or racing against Princeton and Georgetown on Lake Carnegie.

The Tigers swept the morning races

Having been a part of the SARA executive board for the past five years, I am honored and excited to take the reins as SARA President. A special thanks to Tracy Smith, our past President, for the dedication, energy, excitement and advancement of SARA over the past two years. Tracy follows a long list of distinguished and dedicated alumni serving on the SARA board of directors. I am convinced we have the strongest and most dedicated rowing alumni across the league and of any sport at Syracuse.

The 2012 rowing season has already launched for Syracuse and there are high expectations. Both the men's and women's team have had strong fall seasons and intensive winter trainings. The men have a very competitive start to their schedule in New Jersey with Princeton (preseason #4) and Georgetown, followed by the Goes Trophy (Cornell and Navy) at Syracuse, Conlan Cup (BU and Columbia) in Boston, Eastern Sprints, Packard Cup (Dartmouth) in New Hampshire and the season finale IRA in Camden NJ.

The women have already started their season with a strong showing at Clemson. Syracuse hosts Boston U, Cornell and Rutgers, followed by another home regatta with Penn and Northeastern. The Orange women then move on to Boston for the Charles River Challenge and Indianapolis for the Big East Double Duel. Finally, they finish with the season finale with the Big East Championship in New Jersey on May 13.

SARA has many great events planned for this year. SARA will continue to offer live race coverage with a free dial-in service throughout the season. Also, on June 1, during the IRA, SARA is will be hosting an event at historic Boathouse Row in Philadelphia. Joe Paduda and John Nicholson will continue their great work writing on Mark of the Oarsmen II. The SARA Men's Crew Endowment has kicked off a fund raising campaign from April 1 through mid June.

All of these activities and more are supported by your annual dues and donations. If you have not yet paid your dues, please do so through the SARA blog or our PO Box.

SARA will continue to be your source of information, entertainment and team support. Thank you again supporting SARA and Syracuse Rowing.

as expected, beating the Orange V8 by a couple of lengths, with the Hoyas another couple of lengths back. Princeton just edged the Orange in the JV race by a second and change with Georgetown far behind. SU's frosh also gave Princeton a good run for its money, finishing less than five seconds behind with the Hoyas trailing well back.

In what was called the 3V/2F extravaganza, the Tigers' 3V heavyweights were first, followed by the 2F heavies and the 3V lights, then SU's second frosh with Georgetown's second frosh last.

SU's varsity eight opened the season ranked 14th in the US Rowing Coaches' Poll with Georgetown right behind at #15 and Princeton at #4.

The next test for the Orange is April 14 at home – the first official racing of the season – when the Orange take on Cornell and Navy for the Goes Trophy.

Rough Autumn, Better Winter

Reischman was less than thrilled with the squad's performance during the fall season, but seemed encouraged by progress during winter training. "We had four or five seniors (hit personal records) on their March 2k test by 4 or 5 seconds and that is significant and represents a lot of hard work," Reischman said. "This group was led by Chris Lutz who tied the school record at 5:49.6. The record he tied belonged to team mate Nemanja Bogdanovic who was out with an injury when we tested."

Orange Men in Spring Camp at Clemson

Now in his tenth season as head man for the Orange, Reischman has always downplayed early season results (even though they've

usually been winning results) and aimed for the Eastern Sprints and the IRA. Now that crews have to qualify for the IRA instead of automatically being in, Reischman may very well be even more focused. "What we need to find out is do we have enough horsepower within that potential to qualify for the IRA in an always improving EARC," he said before the races at Princeton.


Multi-talented Coxswain

coming in third in the Varsity Eights in a seven-boat race hosted by then #18 Clemson on St. Patrick's Day. SU finished a length-and-a-half behind the Tigers and Indiana, who finished in a dead heat at 6:46.21. Syracuse edged Iowa for third and also out-rowed BU, Purdue and Marist. The time was ten seconds closer to Clemson than a year ago and five seconds closer to Indiana.

The second varsity also was third behind Iowa and Clemson, while the varsity four and novice eight were second in their races behind Clemson.

Coach Justin Moore is relying heavily on freshmen and sophomores this season as he builds the boats with many of his own recruits. There were two freshmen and three sophomores in the V8 for the first home race.

"With the youth of our group, we feel that our learning curve is going to be steep and that there are much faster and more complete races ahead of us," Moore said after the racing at Clemson.

SU's youth came into play in the first home races with the Orange jumping out to a lead in the first race against BU only to have the Terriers row through them in the second half of the race and then hang on for the win. BU had turned around quickly after a poor performance at Clemson and showed it.

Cornell's 16th ranked varsity includes seven seniors and two juniors. The Big Red walloped BU after winning easily over Rutgers in the opener. Every other Cornell boat including its second V4 and 4V8 (yes, Cornell has a fourth varsity eight) followed suit.

After knocking off BU in the early races, SU's 2V8, 4V and 3V8 gave the Big Red a run in the early going but Coach Hilary Gehman's crews steadily rowed away from the hard-fighting Orange, winning each race by open water.

Coach Moore has said he admires what Gehman has done in a fairly short period of time in bringing the Cornell program to prominence. That's what he and his assistants are working on doing with the Syracuse program and while it's not showing yet in terms of wins for the varsity eight, it does seem evident in improved fitness and improved times.

Next for the Orange-another home race with Northeastern and Penn.

SU to Host U23 Women's Camp this Summer

After a successful US Rowing Pre-Elite Camp in the summer of 2011, Syracuse is stepping up to host the Under-23 Camp this year. SU Women's Coach Justin Moore will coach the sweep oars with assistance from men's assistant Shawn Bagnall. Men's Head Coach Dave Reischman joins in to work with the scullers and will have Cornell Women's Head Coach Hilary Gehman working with him.

"Dave and I are a good fit in this Olympic year," Moore told *The Orange Oar*. "It is an excellent use of our facilities and the experience within our coaching staff."

Questions and Answers about the SARA Endowment

Q: What is an endowment?

A: An endowment is an investment vehicle which has a very long term focus (i.e. perpetuity) where distributions are based on an expected return of appreciation, interest and dividends, while keeping principle intact. Expected distribution is 5% per annum.

Q: How large does the SARA Endowment need to grow for it to becoming meaningful to the program?

A: The goal is \$1 million by 2015. This will generate about \$50,000 per year. This amount would be sufficient to fund an assistant coach's salary, a boat or an away regatta.

Q: What about the Women's team?

A: For several reasons, Coach Moore has decided to wait to establish a SARA Women's crew endowment. At the appropriate time and upon the coach's request, SARA can quickly establish a SARA Women's crew endowment.

Q: What happens to the money if there is a change in status of the crew program?

A: Nothing – the money is still there and will be safeguarded by the SARA Board of Directors. SARA has complete and ultimate control over the funds and the distribution or liquidation of the endowment.

Q: Who decides how the funds are used?

A: Ultimately, it is the SARA Board which votes on the distribution of funds. A dedicated SARA Endowment Board has been created. Discussion, coordination and planning will begin with this Endowment sub-group and then be vetted fully with the SARA Board.

Q: Is the Endowment subject to NCAA rules?

A: Yes – we will be working closely with the University to make sure there will be transparency and compliance with the use of funds.

Q: Who is Central New York Community Foundation (CNYCF)?

A: CNYCF is a Syracuse-based organization that has been in existence since 1925. It has over \$100M under its management managing several small to large endowments mostly for central New York based organizations. CNYCF is a known and respected organization, with several SARA members having invested with CNYCF in the past, including Barry Weiss, Bill Sanford and Lisa Moore. Their website is www.cnycf.org

Q: How is the money's invested and can principle be lost?

A: The endowment will be activity managed by CNYCF in a balance portfolio of institutional funds (equities, bonds, real estate funds, etc). SARA does not any investment discretion on how the funds are invested. There is a long term focus taken on the investment, were principle is put a risk and can be lost. Over the long term it is reasonable to expect there is a positive return. According to CNYCF, over the long term, the fund can expect an approximately 8%. Investment performance of the CNYCF can viewed on their website www.cnycf.org.

Any sizable donation can be coordinated through Coach Reischman, Tracy Smith or Joe Kieffer, or Mary Meyers Esq., Senior Vice President, CNYCF.

Q: Can I contribute something other than cash?

A: Yes – provide that the asset (e.g. stock, life insurance) is of an appropriate value. The CNYCF will work with you to convert your asset into liquid funds so they can be invested.

Q: Can I still make donations to Syracuse University – ear marked for crew?

A: Yes – the SARA endowment offers an alternative to donations to the University.

Building Rowing Programs—Pete Hilgartner '84 Doubles Up

The Orange Oar heard that SU alum Pete Hilgartner has gotten a couple of programs going down in Virginia and asked him for an update. Here's his response:



Just so happens that yesterday I had **Kevin Boyle, '03**, out in my launch giving him an orientation before handing him the helm of Loudoun County High School Crew. *(Pete left, Kevin right)*

I am the president of Loudoun Rowing Association and the head coach for Briar Woods High School Crew. Both programs are only a year old. We row on Beaverdam Reservoir in Ashburn, VA. This was one of the designated sites that were considered as the rowing, canoeing and kayaking venue if D.C. had won the 2012 Olympic bid. It's 3400 meters end to end. It's great

little protected body of water. I have been sculling on it for about 6 years since I got tired of driving an hour and a half each way to the Occoquon Reservoir.

There was one kid, Jordan Schafer, at Briar Woods High School who was dumb enough to believe he could get a high school team going and smart enough not to listen to all those who said he couldn't. I was recruited by Jordan's Dad, Rich Schafer, who knew nothing about rowing but wanted to help his son see this through. Since then, things have just grown! In a year, we have built it up as the new epicenter of rowing in Loudoun County, VA. We now have 3 High School teams training there. Briar Woods H.S., Stone Bridge H.S. AND Loudoun County H.S.. We already have a 4 lane course.

There is still much more to do...we need to build more docks, find more launches and are always in need of boats and oars and more coaches. Briar Woods has 78 kids out this year. Stone Bridge and Loudoun County both have about 30. We are also working with the County Board of Supervisors to build rowing facilities in two other locations in the county. One will be right on the Potomac River.

Loudoun Rowing Association will offer learn to row programs this summer for youth, high school age and masters. We are also looking for singles, doubles and quads to offer sculling lessons and training. We also hope to break ground for the Briar Woods boat house in May, which

is possible only due to the generosity of the Mount Hope Baptist Church, who is letting us use some of their property for our boat house and to access the lake.



Our long term goal is to hold regular regattas for High School and Masters. We have a high school coming down from Erie, PA to use the facility for spring training the first week in April. We will also be training with them. Next summer we plan on holding the "Beaverdam 500's" This will be a short sprint regatta in a festival atmosphere where spectators and competitors will be able to watch club youth and masters 500 meter sprint races on a Jumbotron-type screen. The goal is to make this as much fun for the spectators as the rowers. The idea is to encourage rowers to enter multiple races throughout the day.

Needless to say, rowing is IN Loudoun County!

A Great Save: An Old Oar Remembers "The Doc" as a Doctor

Since SARA Co-founder Dr. Bruce Chamberlain left us last fall, crew alums have continued to send us memories of the man and how he affected their lives. Here is a powerful story from Bart Green '56, which puts together the doctor's connection to crew and his skill as a surgeon.



I rowed in 1952 - 56 and then coached what I think was S.U.'s only Lightweight Crew during the 1956-57 season, when I was in grad school getting a M.S. in engineering. During those years, Doc Chamberlain (and Bernie Dawson) was regularly around for practice and singing after mealtimes at the Boathouse. In short, he was a constant reminder to Syracuse oarsmen that there was a rich tradition from the past, and he had stories about rowing on the Hudson (and facing floods, etc.) and Coach Ten Eyck

After I married Carol in 1957, we went to Air Force assignments in Casablanca and then Paris (two years each) and then returned to S.U. for a year of grad work in economics at the Maxwell School and then the Law College for three years. In my third year at law school, I was editor-in-chief of the law review, and thus Carol and I had a Christmas party for law review editors at our WW II leftover prefab house in Skytop (it was December of 1964).

Well, it seems that Carol was making whipped cream to use in making Tom and Jerrys (nobody remembers them today), when she put her hand down to remove the mixer paddles from the mixer motor and by mistake hit the switch that turned the motor on and cut off one of her fingers, clean through skin and bone, leaving it dangling with only a small piece of skin. When this happened, she threw her hands into the air, which resulted in lots of whip cream and lots of blood being scattered all over the kitchen, including on the ceiling. It was a very cold and stormy winter night (the party wasn't due to start until 8:00 p.m.), and our front steps were icy, and when I attempted to help Carol (with her injured hand and almost falling off finger wrapped in a towel, soaked with blood) down the steps, we both fell and went plop, plop down the steps. We were uninjured and quickly recovered Carol's bandage and loose finger, got in the car and drove to Memorial Hospital (where I had been born).

By an enormous stroke of good luck (this was a stormy Saturday evening a few days before Christmas), we encountered Doc Chamberlain in the hallway of the Hospital. He immediately took charge of the situation, took Carol to a treatment room and (after giving her Novocain, I'm sure) sewed her finger back on and bandaged it. We told him that we had party guests arriving at our house in a few minutes, and he said to me, "Take her home, give her a very strong scotch, and go ahead with your party." Which is exactly what we did, although our guests were somewhat nonplused by the whipped cream and blood on the kitchen ceiling.



Carol's finger healed beautifully, and now, almost five decades later, Carol's finger works and looks fine, thanks to Bruce's expert medical attention. So, I remember him not only as one of the most dedicated "old oars" from my rowing days but also as the doctor who saved my lovely wife's finger. What a guy!


Kieffer Steps Up to Lead SARA: Pascale Is New First Vice-President


